Council Highlights – Meeting held July 14, 2020

- This meeting was held virtually via Zoom
- Significant discussion took place regarding returning to in-person worship, planned for July 19, 2020.
 - Note: In response to new directives regarding indoor gatherings from the Governor on July 15th and guidance received from our Bishop on July 16th, the Council executives met on July 16th and determined that we needed to remain virtual for worship at the present time. This will be reviewed and discussed again at the August 11th, council meeting.
 - Council discussed lines of communication if someone attending worship should report they
 have tested positive for COVID-19. Should this be the case, that individual(s) should
 communicate directly with either Terri Lombardo (Council President) or with Pastor Peggy
 Suhr-Barkley (Local Interim Pastor). They will then communicate with each other and make
 the necessary notifications for worshippers. Identifying information will remain confidential
 and would only be shared if permission has been given in writing.
- It was determined that Worship would remain at 10:00am throughout the summer.
- There was discussion of how best to approach Sunday School and Youth Group as we approach the school year. This discussion will continue.
- Some significant property concerns were discussed. Some leaks have developed in the roof, apparent in "flat-roof" sections of the building between the main entrance and Shepherd's Center. Arrangements will be made with roofers to review and advise direction. A tree at the edge of the property which has the potential to fall in the neighbor's driveway was also discussed. This is also being investigated to see if it can be removed without damage to the other two trees it is growing near and into. There was also additional discussion about our status with heating in the building. At this point, the roof is the highest priority to address.
- In consideration of options for the future, there was discussion of meeting with a Pastor or two, familiar with the co-op model for congregations. Pastor Peggy will make arrangements to have such a Pastor join the September Council meeting to discuss.
- The next Church Council Meeting is planned to be held virtually on August 11, 2020 at 7:00 p.m. This meeting is planned to be held via Zoom.

Easy Buttermilk Scones Casa Sedona B&B

2 1/2 cup flour 1/2 cup sugar 3/4 isp. Baking soda 3/4 cup buttermilk(can substitute with milk & about 1 T of Vinegar) 1/2 cup melted butter 1/2 cup dried cranberries, nuts, fruits, chocolate chips —I use mini-Chocolate chips, etc.

Combine dry ingredients in a large mixing bowl; add buttermilk, melted butter and minichocolate chips. Fold gently until evenly moistened. **Do not over mix.** On a greased baking sheet, drop spoonsful of batter about 1 inch apart. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 - 17 minutes until lightly browned. Makes 12 - 16 scones. Mrs. Shaulis's Coffee Cake From Camp Lutherlyn

Dough: Sift Together: 1 1/2 cups flour 2/3 cups sugar 2 tsp baking powder 1/2 tsp salt

Add: 1 egg 3/4 cup milk 2 Tbsp melted shortening/butter

Mix dough well. Put in a 9x13 or smaller greased pan.

Topping:(This puts a small amount of topping on the cake. If you like a lot of topping, double the topping recipe.) Mix Together: 3 Tbsp brown sugar 1 Tbsp flour

1/2 tsp cinnamon

Add:


1 Tbsp melted butter Use a fork to mix the melted butter into the sugar mixture. Sprinkle topping on the dough. 

Dear GSLC Members and Friends,

It came to council's attention again this past February that we have a long list of repairs that need to be done to the church in order to continue to use our building. Let me explain to the best of my ability some of the issues we as a congregation are looking at in order to stay at 2323 Old Butler Road. We have prioritized some the needs of the church as to what can wait and what needs to be done immediately.

The first repair we need to address is the flat roof. Over the years, we have made many repairs to the roof to keep the water from damaging the inside of the church. In February, when we had the soffit and fascia redone (and doesn't it look nice!), the workers told us that the condition of the roof was going to compromise the work they did on the soffit and fascia. Slippery Rock Roofing was called in to look at the roof, but then the pandemic hit which put everything on pause. Many questions were raised when the pandemic hit. One was, "Are we ever going to be able to afford to come back to the church?" Fortunately, we were able to get a loan that will turn into a grant for \$6700 to cover some of our payroll and utility expenses for May and June. And even better yet, our fear of losing income because we were not worshiping in person did not materialize. THANK YOU! THANK YOU! THANK YOU for all of your offerings! Your generosity has been uplifting. Also, not having a full-time pastor to pay meant we did not have to touch our savings. So many blessings! In the past couple of weeks the roof situation has become more dire. Leaks have multiplied and ceiling tiles have fallen in many areas of the church. Our primary concern before the pandemic started became something we couldn't postpone taking care of another day. We are currently accepting bids for repairs.

The second item we have to address is a tree which has been damaged by carpenter ants. It will fall and possibly damage a neighbor's property which we can't let happen. Bids to take down the tree have been obtained -\$700.

Third, the office heating unit died and flooded the office last fall. K'rin worked with the little heat that the unit in the pastor's office could provide. The unit in the main office needs replaced. Caldwell gave us a bid on the unit for \$6400.

Next, the sanctuary, as I'm sure you all are aware, had to have the heating turned off last winter on the whole right side of the church because the water that was leaking under the church was costing us hundreds of dollars a month to keep it on in water bills, not to mention what the water might be doing to the foundation of the church as it constantly flowed under the church. We managed to keep enough heat in the sanctuary with it turned off, but it needs repaired in case the same thing happens to the other set of pipes on the other side of the church causing us to have no heat at all. Tens of thousands of dollars will be involved in this project.

Do I even mention the damage that was done to the basketball pole by the neighborhood children that we could repair?

Another concern we need to address is the lighting in the Shepherd's Center. When the election people came in to set up the voting machines in June, Vicar went in to turn on the lights and they didn't all work. He called me and I told him, "Oh you just have to wait for them to turn on. They're the kind of lights that have to warm up." Not the right answer. They too need fixed. Cost unknown.

And then finally, there is the cost of replacing the roof over the sanctuary. It is slowly washing away and filling up the gutters. After almost fifty years it is a job that has to be done. Cost –CRAZY!

We probably have enough money to address the first three concerns. So this letter that was meant just to be informative in nature is now going to get personal. I always like you to know what is going on financially as we continue to be a family who wants to continue to worship together. These projects could be our demise. Many of you have read about other churches in the community that have reached this point and have decided to close because they couldn't afford to make the necessary repairs. I hope that made you upset. It does me. I look at those articles every day and wonder if and when that will happen to us. Then I think that each day we don't know what is in store for us. This pandemic has proven that for sure. We can only deal with the present today and pray for guidance for the future. Are we willing to make sacrifices to keep this beautiful space we worship in today? I can't help but say let's work hard and save our church because that's what we do. This is not the time for an ending. It is a time for a rebirth. We can look upward to the magnificent cross that hangs over our altar that was paid for by pennies children gave one by one so that we would have a beautiful reminder that Christ died for us and is present in our lives always and know that we too can put our pennies together to create something magnificent! I know I myself have thought, well why give my money if we don't even have a full-time pastor to lead us from week to week. We will just get the church all fixed up and then close anyhow. Then I get mad at myself, because that is a give up attitude and I for one am not giving up. I still see our church as a "Beacon on the Hill" -- a place for all to know God. There is a purpose for us all to be here together. In my heart, I know there is still a job to do through this church and through this group of people. I believe if you look deep down in your heart, you too can see a future in which this church provides us a place where God can nurture us and lead us to do His work.

We are being hit with financial woes, but the money we need to fix them will come. I know it will. We can take care of these issues and move on. Pray for your church. Pray for understanding how you can be a part of this rebirth. And pray for all to know Christ. He is our Good Shepherd, always there for us to walk with Him, day-by-day through the good and the bad. Through Him each day is a blessing!

One day at a time got us to 50 years of being Good Shepherd!
