50 Years as Good Shepherd

As we look back to more than 50 years ago when Good Shepherd Church was being planned, we can be thankful that we can do it through this story that has been given to us by one of our founding fathers, George Tervo. Sit back and enjoy...

The History of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church
New Castle, Pennsylvania
By George Tervo
(This is a written transcription of an audio tape made by George Tervo.)

The Log Lutheran Church was organized in 1800, in Princeton, Pennsylvania, now the site of the Pleasant Valley Cemetery, and it was the first Lutheran church in Lawrence County. This building, as rustic as it was, served the Lutheran ministries of the area until Jerusalem Lutheran Church was organized in 1876. It was built near the site of the Log Church and it served its people for over a half century until it was disbanded. Meanwhile, St. Paul's Lutheran Church, which was located at the present site of the Pizza Hut at the corner of Grant and North Jefferson Street, was organized in November of 1848 to serve the Lutheran people who were arriving at that time from Germany and there were various Saxons and Transylvanians that came at that time. They were formed to membership of St. Paul's Lutheran Church. Then, later in the 1890s, there was an immigration of Finnish people that came to this area mainly to work in the tin mill. They formed a church that is presently the Church of God on Ray Street, on the East Side of New Castle, and it was organized in December of 1900. Later, in the 1960s, this church changed its name to Trinity Lutheran Church, and part of this church accepted the membership of Bessemer Finnish Lutheran Church that was organized in 1903. In 1941, it became affiliated and merged with the New Castle church. Then, in 1904, Bethany Lutheran Church was organized, and it continued to serve until 1962. The church building and parsonage still is standing across from the Almira Home on East Washington Street and it is presently used as a playhouse where they have various plays and so forth for the community. (Note to the reader: This former church building was later demolished after a gas explosion in the area knocked it off its foundation.)

Then Redeemer Lutheran Church was formed, and it was intended that this merger would include Trinity Church. It was not until October 26, 1970, that this step in God's plan of church unity took place. There was a period of negotiations from 1962 to 1970 before this happened. All these predecessor churches of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church served well as

they were called by the Lord to serve mainly ethnic people that did not understand the English language and they served first in their native language totally. And then, later in the late 1940s and early 50s, it was realized that in order to profess the Word of God and witness to the community, that the English language was brought into the church, at first slowly and gradually, so that everyone would understand that they weren't trying to push the language question out of existence. Good Shepherd Lutheran Church then was a result of this merger and this happened in 1970.

In the winter of 1970 and '71, it was a Church Planning Committee and Site Committee that were appointed by the congregation and a written building program was approved. The Site Committee had several sites that they visited and looked over to see which would be the best for our needs and the Lord's hand seemed to again present itself, that they decided that they would go down and see Mr. Weingartner who owns Weingartner Florists, Mr. Bob Weingartner and his wife, and asked them if they would be interested in selling a parcel of land where the present church building is located. They said that other people have asked them about this property, and they have outright turned them down. But they felt that, after explaining what the church building was about and how it was the people desired that the hand of God work in Shenango Township here in this community and after the survey of the area it was to be a growing community. In fact, the bypass that we see from our church was nonexistent. It was already in the talking state, so the Planning Committee visited the Pennsylvania State Highway Department in Franklin, Pennsylvania, to see where this Route 422 bypass was to be located. As a result of that survey, everybody enthusiastically had the desire to try to purchase this property from Weingartners. Another interesting fact is that at that time, we purchased 4 and 4/10 acres of land, 300-foot frontage on old 422, 630 feet deep for the price of \$12,500. When this check was presented to the Weingartners, they in turn wrote a check for \$2,500 back to Good Shepherd Lutheran Church because they felt that it was a worthwhile cause. So, this is how the Lord blessed us even in the purchase of the property.

After many, many committee meetings, we naturally knew that this was a real act of faith. We owned these old church properties and church properties are not the best thing to sell on the market, so as a result of selling the various old previous church properties, we realized somewhere in the neighborhood of \$170,000. Then, the Finance Committee of the Planning Committee went down to First Federal Bank and we had some estimates from our architects at that time that the church would come to cost somewhere in the neighborhood of \$475,000. We talked to Norman Clark, the chairman of the board, and to Mr. Houk who was the president of First Federal and they went along and said that there would be no problem obtaining a mortgage of \$300,000 so that the building program could proceed. The interest on the \$300,000 was 6.5%. We had an architect selected. It was Brooks and Redfoot from Sharon, Pennsylvania, Dale Redfoot being a member of Christ Lutheran Church in Sharon. He was also handicapped. He was stricken with polio in his senior year in high school and that's why today, in the architecture of the church, we realize what a great benefit this was in God's leading because in this day and age, all public buildings are to serve the handicapped, and here we had in 1971, already selected an architect that had this vision. So in all of the church itself, there are no stairs that have to be negotiated. There are ramps, even at the altar, that are wheelchair accessible and the church itself has no stairways for entry.

In December of 1971, the contracts for this church were awarded and the contractors at that time, the General Contractor was George Stevens of New Castle, the heating was A & B of New Castle, Pennsylvania, the electrical was Marino Electric of New Castle, the plumbing was D.J. Hannon of New Castle, and the total contracts and all the work at the Day of Dedication, which was on Sunday, May 27, 1973, the total of all costs when we moved into this building, was \$464,837.00. Of this, in excess of \$30,000 was given as gifts and memorials for various items in the church, such as the faceted glass, the stained glass, the cross over the altar which was purchased by a half mile of pennies, for \$474. All of these pennies were given by the Sunday school of the church. There were other donations such as the Knox Foundation of New Castle. They gave \$5,000 for the pastor's office furnishings and whatever was necessary so that the office could be used for counseling, not only for the members of our church, but as you know, the pastor counsels people whether they're members of our church or just members of the community. There were many, many gifts that were given. As I think back, all the church pews, all the altar furnishings, the altar stonework was all donated by members of our parish. Some of the work was professionally done from non-members, but no charge was ever presented on any of the altar work. Then, as another point of interest, the altar rock itself weighs approximately 1 ton and it was procured from the banks of the Neshannock Creek above Volant with proper permissions and so forth. It was delivered here by some local business people free of charge.

When the Planning Committee was discussing the altar itself, which was the prime concern of the Planning Committee that it shows itself in a very worshipful attitude and that God and Christ are revealed from the time you walk into the nave of the church that you realize that God is in this place, that He is present. The organ of the church was relocated from Trinity Lutheran Church and with the necessary renovations, it came to cost a little less than \$2,000. It was the newest of the existing organs. It was only 7 years old at that time and it has served well, even to this day.

Now some of the points of interest as I think about the outside of the building: The corner stone was laid on August 27, 1972, and as I mentioned before, the dedication service was May 27, 1973. As you look at the church from the Old Butler Road side, or the south side, it is very prominent as you come up the 422 bypass or if you come in on 422 from New Castle or from the Butler side. You notice that you see this high church building, which is 44 feet from the ground to the peak of the roof and it was made the shape it is to designate that this is to be a mighty fortress. It is to give you the appearance of a mighty fortress. The brick on the cross wall of the church, or where the lighted aluminum cross is planted, the brick behind it is a distressed brick, which when it was put into the mold in a soft condition, it was distressed by using a lead-filled piece of garden hose and as it was soft, it was beat into there by hand into each brick to show that Christ suffered on the cross and this was certainly a reminder of the distress that he went through. The rest of the brick throughout the church shows the imprint, every brick in the church, shows the imprint of a grape vine. So, if you look closely, you will see that it speaks as a witness to all of us that Christ is the vine and we are the branches, and this is what it is supposed to designate.

If you look above the main entry of our church, you will notice glass panels in an irregular pattern. These are faceted glass of various colors. They're actually stained, but the glass is thick. It's at least an inch thick, each piece of each facet. Looking from the balcony level, they are relatively darker than up at the top arch. They are a brilliant color. This is the same with the stained-glass windows. From the altar they are light. From the front of the church, they are light and as you look back towards the rear of the church, each one is a slight shade darker. The reason for this is that it's supposed to accentuate the cross and the altar, that our thoughts do not stray away from the central meaning of the church and that is our worship to God through the altar, through Communion and through prayer that is rendered at the altar rail. Another point of interest of the nave is that there are no hanging chandeliers that would distract our thoughts from the worship service and the key part of the worship service, the sermon and the Word of God that is preached from the pulpit and the altar area. So, all of the lighting has been hidden behind the arches so that they are not a distraction to a holy atmosphere in the worship service of our congregation.

When the height of the church was to be decided at the 44-foot level, the means by which this resulted from flying a gas-filled balloon and putting it up in the air and then going around to the various highways and observation points as you're entering the area of the church to make sure that it was visible to the community and presented a welcome to all those that pass on the various highways. The church furnishings, the altar furnishings, if you note, all have a pear metal look to it pointing upward. The pulpit, the baptismal font, the spokes on the altar railings, and any of the furnishings used inside of the altar are of this design. This again is to point our attention upward to the main theme of the worship area and that is the cross and the altar. If you notice the altar has three steps going up to what they call the predella or the kneeling platform. These three steps are there to remind us of the Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit. The choir loft is located to the rear of the congregation and this again was decided to be the musical area of the church and not to distract from the worship service itself. If it had been located in the front, of course, the Planning Committee and the Worship Committee felt that it would take away from the real worship service to some extent, and that's why the choir is located to the rear of this congregation.

The area which we call the narthex or the entrance to the nave and the entry hall was so located for an overflow. It was supposed to be an overflow for approximately 50 attendants or members when it was necessary. The library is there because we know that the Word of God is to be studied by all and we wanted to have an area where members of the congregation feel free to go in and research the various subjects, whether it be for Sunday school education or throughout life. There is a resource there that the congregation is free to use at any time. The kindergarten area of the Sunday school classroom area is well-lighted, and it also has an accordion fold door which divides it into two parts, and it is multiple use. It is used by the choir for their practice sessions as well as for the Sunday school students. The nursery area is so furnished, and the plumbing fixtures are designed for the purpose that the young children can use the facilities at their

own need. The cupboards in the play area are for toys and also for the attendants so the attendant can easily pay attention to any individual student. The floor of this area was with electric heat mats so that the floor would be warm, but in later years, the floor was carpeted and made the use of this electrical heated floor unnecessary. Now, as you go beyond this point, there's an exterior corridor leading to the exit that has a pair of doors. This was so designed for future Sunday school classroom additions. It is to contain eight classrooms and storage areas also in this addition. It was originally intended as a future classroom expansion and we just pray that someday this expansion will be necessary.

The boiler room and the boiler itself was so designed that it would take care of this additional expansion. The boiler was sized such that it would be able to heat and take care of it. The nave of the church also, the piping below the floor is ready for air conditioning, if the need ever arises. Since we've been in the building now for twenty years plus, we've found that the air handling system in the church itself has been well enough designed that this air conditioning has not been necessary. Although in the original building, there was \$4,000 allowed to do all the necessary underground work, it would cost an additional \$45,000 to air condition this portion of the building. The family room of the church is used for various reasons. It's used for small meetings, auxiliary groups where they hold their meetings, for Bible classes, and also, it's used for wedding preparations and funerals also. The back altar wall where you see the triangles, the triangles on that back wall behind the hanging cross, these were designed by an engineer in Youngstown, Ohio, who designed these types of walls and it is one-of-a-kind. What he did was make a pattern of triangles and he had the vision that this is to represent rippling waters. The shape of them also represents the Trinity, the triangle. This pattern, once it was furnished for our church, the patterns were destroyed. I was asked to say a few more words about the altar stone itself: The altar stone itself was taken from scripture as the way they built their altars originally in the early churches. The foundation below this rock itself extends down through the platforms which form the altar and goes down to an earth foundation and then there's a masonry foundation up to the base of the rock so that the altar is firmly standing on solid ground.

The top of the altar table is wormy chestnut and that is also from scripture as you read about the wormwood and the gall. The rock, you notice, has many clefts in it and this rock as you see it now, is very close to the way it was found along the Neshannock Creek. There was a slight bit of trimming done to it and if you notice, there are no chisel marks showing, no signs of the tool and this is scriptural. We find in scripture it says, "On this rock, I will build my church." So that is some of the history behind this rock and people that look at this, they can interpret various meanings for themselves and their Christian faith. It also has a lifeline running through it if you will look at it closely and the man that was a non-church member that helped do the work on the altar rock itself said that there is no way after he did the work on it and knew what it was representing, that rock spoke to him, and he said there is no way that I can present a bill for this altar stone. At the dedication of the building, he and his family were there although they were members of another church, so it spoke before dedication to people. And may it speak to all of us as we go to church and observe the altar itself and the area of the altar.

Another interesting fact is that before dedication, and the lighting system was first placed into the church, into the nave, and somebody turned the church light on, the hanging cross was already in place and how amazing it was to all of us, it was like an act of God, that the reflection from the lighting through the cross represented the Trinity or Calvary itself. When you think of Calvary, you think of Christ on the cross and then the other two crosses with the thieves. This was not planned, not by any of the members of the committee or by the architect, it was just something that was an act of God and we certainly thank Him for this. Some people came into the church on Dedication Day, when they came into the church, it was naturally lit up and some of the people, their jaws dropped and they said, "My, what a holy place!" and that was really a good feeling to know that the people of the church and everybody that was involved, all the members that were involved in the planning and so forth, that the vision that they had seen spoke to visitors, not only from our church, but from other churches, people from out of town. Through all of this, we had learned one thing and that was that our theme at that time was "Aim High" and then, from the book of Proverbs, 29th chapter, the 18th verse, it says, "Where there is no vision, the people perish" and we must keep a vision before us at all times and the congregation will enthusiastically overcome any endeavor that they are faced or object that they are faced to encumber.

The building itself is a zoned building. The fellowship hall itself can be separated from the rest of the church. You can come in through the entrance, have the other doors all closed and the fellowship hall and kitchen area can be used by groups of the community without them traveling through all the worship areas of the church building itself. The

landscaping for the church was done by the members of the congregation but the landscape design was done by a well-known landscape architect from Pittsburgh. His name was Dominic Palumbo. He was a golf course designer and well-known throughout the world. When he was approached to make a drawing and give us an idea of what the landscaping should look like, he made a complete drawing of the whole area and he was asked when he completed that and presented it to the church, to send his bill for the work that he had done and he says, "There is no way I will expect to receive anything from the design." He said as long as it was memorialized by the various people of the congregation, he will accept no monetary gift, so we were thankful for that.

Then, we go to the concrete paving. All of the paving of the outside parking lots, the driveways, was done by the membership of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church. That was started, the base was put in for dedication and so forth, and the main sidewalks were put in the by the general contractor on the building. May 1974, the first concrete went into the paving and the members of the congregation, those that did not work on the concrete itself, they donated the funding to purchase concrete and the members, I have to say not men, but the members, because there were ladies present also, did all the work and grass and half of the concrete was placed in the year 1974, beginning in May, and ending in July. It was done every Saturday. First time when they were asked for a workday, some of us that were on the committee wondered how many would show up because there was no pressure applied. The first day, we ordered two trucks of concrete to come and we figured if nobody shows, at least we could get rid of two trucks of concrete. Well, as it was, there were 35 members who came out there. We saw we would have enough construction men that we ordered more concrete and each Saturday then we would place 45 cubic yards of concrete. Then, when the money ran out that was gifted, we found out we were able to do 50% of the total concrete as you see it today. People of the congregation still kept donating to this cause, so in 1979, the same thing occurred, we placed the balance of the concrete work as you see it in the parking lots and driveways, but the grand total of concrete that was placed was 575 cubic yards. At that time, Troggio's on 422, Troggio's Restaurant, put blacktop in. Their blacktop cost them the same per square foot as our concrete. The only difference is, Troggio's has been re-blacktopped three times since then. Ours is still the original, so there we were blessed again by people that had the faith, the time, the talent, and those that gave monetarily to this challenge of getting our site into a respectable order. So again, it points out that if the people of our congregation have a challenge, they will answer that challenge and the only way these things were able to happen was through the strong faith and conviction of the members themselves and we thank the Lord for His rich blessing throughout this project and may we in the future pray diligently as those before us have prayed that our witness to this community will continue to grow in the coming years.

Council Highlights – Meeting held February 9, 2021

- This meeting was held virtually via Zoom
- Ruth Johns reported that the PPP money was deposited into our account. This PPP period will last until the middle of July.
- Shirley Mazzocca made a motion to accept the financial reports for January 2021. Jodi Tammaro seconded. The motion carried.
- The synod sent out paperwork for the end of year audit. Council will do the 2020 end of year audit following the March council meeting.
- We are planning to video church services starting on March 14th. Ruth Johns will look into buying the licenses to print bulletins and sing hymns online.
- The members of council received a proposed constitution in the mail from Pastor Peggy Suhr-Barkley. Council will table approving this until next month to give the members more time to read it.
- The church has been cleaned and there are still more jobs to do on the cleaning checklist. Ruth Johns is buying ceiling tiles for the ladies restroom.
- Fred reported that he cleaned the men's room and is going to work on cleaning the floors and walls. The plants inside the church have died from the cold.
- Barbara Turk and Diana Tervo are currently on the insurance with Ruth Johns. We need two new members to be contact people. Terri Lombardo and Shirley Mazzocca offered to be contact people.
- Linda Marttala made the motion to put Terri Lombardo and Shirley Mazzocca on the insurance policy along with Ruth Johns as contact people and take Barbara Turk and Diana Tervo off. Grover Welsh seconded. The motion carried.
