Reformation

More than skin deep

Gratitude, said Martin Luther, is the basic Christian attitude." Yet gratitude is much more than a state of mind. Often it's a decision, and it becomes an act of humility when we recognize our depravity – and our need for a Savior.

The 10 disgraced lepers who beg Jesus for mercy (see Luke 17:11-19) are described as *allogenes*, Greek for "outcast." (All humans, sick with sin, fit that description!) The leper who returned to give thanks received more than just physical healing, according to Scripture. When Jesus says "Your faith has made you well," he uses the Greek that means "Your faith has saved you." The grateful leper, recognizing his depravity, humbly decides to return and give thanks, knowing – through faith – that his skin and his soul have been healed.

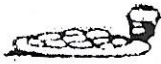

highlights

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING held Sunday, September 16th:

The following information was distributed:

- 1] Financial Comparison Report
- 2] Averages for 2017 and the first half of 2018
- 3] A list of spending cuts the council has enacted to reduce spending

- 4] A list of Good Shepherd's ministries

The Financial Report was reviewed. It was noted that more money was given to Good Shepherd in 2017 than we will receive for 2018, if the current rate of giving continues. Brian Johns stated that he spoke informally with Bishop Kusserow about our financial situation while attending the ELCA Youth Gathering in July. The Bishop mentioned several options we might consider. Those included a stewardship campaign and merging with another church.

The following were some of the questions raised by those attending the meeting and answers which were given.

- 1] Are there people who do not attend church, but who do contribute financially?—Yes, there are some.
- 2] Can we use Special Funds money to meet the budget? – Yes, we can if we have exhausted all other money first.
- 3] Should we be doing an annual stewardship program?—Yes.
- 4] Should we consider having a part-time pastor?
- 5] Could the Synod require us to have a part-time pastor?—No, control rests with the congregation.
- 6] How can we attract people to our church?—We need to focus our ministry for the community
- 7] How about contacting people who don't attend services?—The Church Council will be calling people to ask them what prayers we can offer for them.
- 8] How long can we continue to operate our church?—If offerings and expenses stay relatively the same, we have projected zero balance (out of money) sometime during 2019-2020. This does not take Special Funds money into account.

- 9] How can we attract people with children? We currently have a youth group.

Some upcoming opportunities in which members could participate: Trunk or Treat on Oct. 28, from 4-6 p.m. at Washington Centre, and Christmas Caroling at the Confluence.

Pastor Ellen said that we need to offer prayer for our church and face our problems head-on. We will have our regular congregational meetings in November, 2018 and January, 2019.

A prayer for pumpkin people

After Liz Curtis Higgs wrote the popular children's book *The Pumpkin Patch Parable*, people began using her analogies to say a prayer while carving their Halloween pumpkins. The pumpkin prayer, a Christian alternative to Halloween traditions, reminds people of all ages what God has done for us. Use it this fall when your family makes jack-o'-lanterns.

- While cutting off the top of the pumpkin, pray, "Lord, open my mind so I can learn new things about you." (See Proverbs 17.)
- While removing the seeds and pulp, pray, "Remove the things in my life that don't please you. Forgive the wrong things I do, and help me forgive others." (See Matthew 6: 14-15.)
- While making eyes, pray "Open my eyes to see the beauty you've made in the world around me." (See Psalm 104:24.)
- While making the nose, pray, "I'm sorry for the times I've turned up my nose at your many gifts." (See James 1:17.)
- While making the the mouth, pray, "Let everything I say please you." (See Psalm 19:14.)
- While lighting the candle, pray, "Lord help me show your light to others through the things I do." (See Matthew 5:16.)

After carving your pumpkins, display them as examples of how God's love transforms us into new creations. (See 2 Corinthians 5:17.)

COUNCIL ACTIONS

from September 11th Meeting:

Brian Johns, Council President, welcomed our guest, Pastor Peter Asplin, Assistant to the Bishop for Congregational Vitality. Pastor Asplin asked members of Council to list things that are good about Good Shepherd and some of our challenges. He also asked us to describe things that are good about Shenango Township and New Castle, and things that are challenging about where we live and where our church is located. He asked about events in our area and talked about how we can be involved in the community. He said that there is no easy solution for our church and community, but encouraged us to be "outward focused." He asked us to make the center of our faith the center of the first stage of change for our church. He also asked us to be in the word and pray for each other and our community. He stated that prayer is where you start.

Church Matters: 1] Carl Turk requested use of the picnic shelter or Shepherd Center if it rains, for Sunday evening, Sept. 30th, for his Laurel class reunion. Curtis Johns/Diana Tervo made a motion to approve this request. 2] The iMac computer in the church office no longer works. Linda Marttala has loaned Good Shepherd a used iMac for Barbara Pawlak to use in its place.

Fellowship: We will hold an Indoor Yard Sale/Bake Sale/Soup Sale/Dry Soup, Cookie and Mint Cocoa Mixes Sale in Shepherd Center on Friday, Oct. 5 and Saturday, Oct. 6, 9 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Sign-up sheets for volunteers to help are on the table in the main hallway. At our regular Church Council meeting on June 12, a decision was made to have 90% of the proceeds from this event go into our General Fund and 10% be given to the New Castle Women's Shelter.

Christian Education: On Wed., August 15th, 4 children in Preschool through Grade 5 attended a Bible Story and Craft Day from 10:30 a.m. -12 Noon. On Rally Day, Sept. 9, 2 children attended the elementary class and 2 individuals attended the S.A.L.T. class for adults and youth.

Worship: Pastor Ellen has received a request that we include some contemporary hymns in our worship services. Pastor Ellen will look into this.

Property: Soffit and Fascia bids update: 1] Fred DeDominicis will ask a contractor who builds houses if he will give us some insight about our project and/or give us a bid. 2] Denny Eagan contacted someone about our soffit and fascia, but that person is too busy and not interested in the job. 3] Brian Johns has someone in mind to contact, but has not talked to him yet. 4] Diana Tervo will obtain the telephone number of someone who might be able to do the work. 5] Pastor Ellen has not been able to talk to Rev. Shaffer because of his ongoing health problems.

The amount of rain we have had recently caused a ceiling tile just outside the living room door to break and fall to the floor. Ceiling tiles in the living room bulged, but did not break. Fred DeDominicis will go on the roof to check for debris in the drains. We may need to have hot tar applied in some areas on the roof.

Vision: At our last meeting on Sept. 10th: – 1] We discussed how we felt God was involved in our lives and how we share those things. 2] We agreed to work on the Trunk or Treat Project again this year. It will be Oct. 28th at Washington Centre. Donations of wrapped candy and volunteers to pass out candy are needed. 3] We were given an article to read by Pastor Ellen about Dinner Church. Feelings were mixed as to whether it would be another viable avenue for worship here at Good Shepherd. 4] Linda Marttala updated us on the cookie and soup jars project she is spearheading for the church. She needs the jars and any other donations turned in to her soon, as she has to start making them for the Yard Sale. We also discussed how to get the youth involved in the project. 5] We discussed ways we might be able to obtain some donations by allowing nonmembers to use Shepherd Center.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Ellen will be attending the SWPA Theological Convocation at Antiochian Village, Monday-Wednesday, Oct. 15-17 and then will be on vacation from

Thursday to Sunday, October 18-21. Pastor Bish will be our Pulpit Supply on Sunday, Oct. 21st. Pastor Peggy Suhr-Barkley will be on call for pastoral care emergencies.

OLD BUSINESS: 1] Although we will probably not be able to fix the soffit and fascia this year, if we obtain written bids, we may be able to apply for grants to help pay for the work which needs to be done. Pastor Ellen will contact the Chaplain for the American Legion Honor Guard about the soffit and fascia work they had done recently. Fred DeDominicis, Brian Johns, and Curt Johns will contact people who may be interested in submitting bids. They will then meet with those who submit bids. 2] The Church Council will meet on Sept. 25th, 7:00p.m., for a time with scripture and a time of prayer. 3] Ruth Johns prepared a report comparing such information as the number of contributing members, attendance, current income, outreach, Thrivent Choice Dollars, special funds, general offerings, and general expenses from 2012 through June 2018. She included a list of spending cuts the Church Council has made, money received from estates from 2007 until 2015, the amount of money we have available to draw from to meet our budget expenses, and a projection of the result if our offerings and expenses stay the same in the future. This report was distributed to Church Council members and distributed to members who attended our Sept, 16h Congregational Meeting.

NEW BUSINESS: 1] Michonda Weber contacted Pastor Ellen with an idea for a way that Good Shepherd could earn some income. In the course of conducting the catering business, Michonda sometimes has clients who are in need of a place to have events such as funeral dinners. She is willing to suggest our Shepherd Center as a suitable location. Terri Tankersley made a motion that Good Shepherd Lutheran Church will make Shepherd Center available for nonmembers to use. Grover Welsh seconded. The motion carried. Before this venture begins, we will need to write up an agreement containing rules of use and pricing. 2] Terri Tankersley suggested making a sign which would invite people to come back to our church to attend services. 3] Fred DeDominicis

suggested that we may wish to consider blocking off access to the main part of the church when Shepherd Center is being used by nonmembers. 5] Pastor Ellen will look into canceling our copier service contracts in an effort to cut expenses.

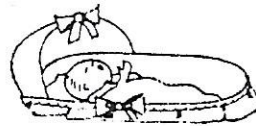

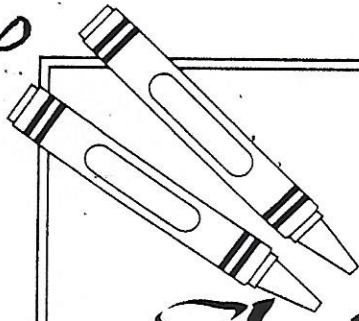
